

Impact by Numbers

Last year, Project Harmony served 8,560 children and families, each facing various challenges.

The children we served were as diverse as their challenges.

More than half of these children were girls (57.5%), and 33% aged 7–12 years old. The majority, close to 73%, were from Douglas County. Our collaboration with numerous professionals and agencies - law enforcement, child protective services, legal authorities, and medical staff - was crucial in helping us amplify our impact.



People and Culture

Project Harmony has deliberately focused on addressing the growing mental health needs of the youth in our community. As these needs become more prevalent, we've adopted innovative approaches to tackle them head-on. One proactive initiative involves cultivating a pipeline within our community for students interested in helping youth and families facing mental health challenges.

To support this pipeline, we've established several educational pathways within Project Harmony designed for students pursuing degrees related to providing mental health support in our communities. Furthermore, we have expanded our network and collaboration with colleges and organizations throughout the Midwest.

These efforts demonstrate Project Harmony's commitment to not only addressing the immediate mental health needs of our youth but also investing in the future of mental health care in our community. By encouraging and supporting students who are passionate about this field, we are helping to ensure that there will be a strong network of qualified professionals available to provide the necessary support and resources for years to come.

Another notable effort deserving recognition is our Employee Engagement Committee's endeavors to acknowledge and appreciate the hard work of all our staff members. Our internal reward program, the Circle of Stars, aligns with our organization's values and mission. In response to feedback, the committee has initiated an engagement survey, aimed to gather more insights directly from our employees.

Moreover, our deliberate focus on onboarding ensures that new hires quickly acclimate to our campus, culture, and their roles. This process is crucial for fostering a positive cultural immersion.

During the first year, we offer targeted training programs tailored to each team, regular check-ins with various leaders, including the Executive Director and Senior Director of People and Culture, and opportunities for feedback through surveys.

Additionally, after six months, new hires participated in a breakfast with the Executive Team and attend a comprehensive workshop on Emergenetics. This workshop emphasizes leveraging diverse thinking and behavior to enhance their contributions to Project Harmony's mission.



Empowering Through Education:



Project Harmony Training Institute's Widespread Impact

In 2023, the Project Harmony Training Institute reached new heights, Participants in our trainings completed 20,900 training interacions. Innovative formats like microlearning modules, asynchronous courses, and virtual sessions accommodated various learning styles.

Attendees praised the engaging facilitation, fresh perspectives, and practical relevance of the training content. Highlights included sessions on culture and diversity, trauma and resilience, and effective presentation skills.

A major milestone was the launch of the Hope Champions Network (HCN) that teaches champions across professions hope science. Hope is the best predictor of future well-being. Champions can maintain hope in themselves while building it in others. Since the inaugural "HCN Train the Trainer" training held in Milford, Nebraska, in May, we have empowered 182 Hope Champions. Subsequently, between May and December, these champions cascaded their knowledge, training 645 individuals and amplifying the impact of the initiative far beyond our initial reach.

Through collaboration, innovation, and commitment to its mission, Project Harmony continues to empower communities worldwide with vital education and skills to create healthier environments, especially for children and families affected by maltreatment.

Connections

Empowering Children and Families:Project Harmony's Connections Program

Project Harmony's Connections Program reached a significant milestone by providing 8,270 individual therapy sessions and 83 groups. This highlights our ongoing commitment to addressing the mental health needs of children and families in the community.

During the fall, we introduced the Connect to Wellness portal, developed through a collaboration between the Project Harmony Training Institute, UNO School of Psychology students, and Connections Staff. The online, self-paced micro-learning modules teach elementary aged children and their caregivers concepts about therapy and coping skills, keeping families engaged while they await therapy.

Through a partnership with Category One, we conducted a longitudinal study on the Connections' clients, which revealed substantial improvements in children's mental health, behaviors at home and school, and overall attendance. Remarkably, clients with below-average attendance demonstrated a significant increase in attendance after completing the program.



A Mother's Gratitude: A Story of Impact



A heartfelt card from a grateful mother highlighted the transformative impact of the Connections Program on her son's life. Her son, once struggling with inner battles and disconnection, found a safe space to explore his emotions without judgment.

What truly made a difference was the opportunity to participate in martial arts. For him, it became a source of strength, discipline, and newfound confidence. With each kick and punch, he could feel his struggles releasing, replacing them with a sense of purpose and resilience.

Mental health coordinators work with families to indentify enrichment activities that support their child's mental health goals and, when needed, help families fund the enrichment activities while their child is a Connections client.

The mother expressed profound gratitude for the support and compassion shown by Chandler, the mental health coordinator, and the entire Connections team. They not only helped her son navigate his challenges but also restored her faith in the power of community and support.




The Ripple Effect: Peer Support in Action

A first-grade student enrolled in Connections was struggling with emotional outbursts due to family turmoil. Instead of disciplining the student, the teacher tried a new approach, allowing the child to step out of the classroom to regain composure.

In the hallway, a fifth-grade student, also a participant in Connections, noticed the younger student's distress. Feeling empathy and concern, the older student approached the first-grader and practiced a calming

technique learned during group therapy sessions: belly breathing exercises.

After a few minutes, the younger child smiled, thanked the older student, and returned to the classroom feeling calmer. The teacher was struck by the powerful impact of peer support made possible by the Connections program. The program equips students with lifelong tools to manage their emotions and support one another.

A Journey of Healing:


Finding Strength in Shared Experiences

A family's life was turned upside down by the devastating impacts of sexual abuse and domestic violence. Seeking help, they turned to Project Harmony. Their journey towards healing began when a courageous child shared their traumatic experiences with the compassionate staff of advocates, forensic interviewers, and medical professionals.

Through therapy, the child started to heal. They participated in a group therapy program tailored to their specific needs, which provided a safe space to process their emotions, build resilience, and regain their sense of self-worth. In this supportive environment, they found a sense of belonging that helped them move forward from their traumatic past.

At the same time, the parents embarked on their own journey by joining a separate therapy group tailored for caregivers. Despite coming from diverse socio-economic and family backgrounds, they found solace in connecting





through shared pain and hope. These parallel groups provided a web of support, offering comfort and strength during immense adversity.

Under the guidance of dedicated advocates and therapists, the groups transformed into forums for learning coping strategies, developing emotional awareness, and harnessing the transformative power of shared experiences. Children explored these concepts alongside siblings who understood their struggles, navigating the turbulent waters of trauma together and drawing strength from their collective resilience.

Shared meals, laughter, and moments of vulnerability forged deep bonds within the groups, creating a sense of family. Gradually, the deep wounds of the past began to heal, replaced by a newfound sense of strength and belonging. As they concluded the programs, they carried with them profound gratitude for the support they had received and a renewed hope for brighter futures ahead, upheld by the healing embrace of this community.

The Calming Presence of Woody and Warrior

For the youth we serve, Woody and Warrior are more than just facility dogs they are companions who provide immense comfort during times of distress and uncertainty. Their gentle presence has an undeniable therapeutic impact, as these touching examples illustrate:

A Reassuring Friend: A runaway youth was distraught over potentially being sent back out-of-state. As she walked with law enforcement officers, her anxiety was palpable. But then Woody approached, his warm eyes and wagging tail providing an instant source of calm. As she knelt to give him pets and scratches, the young girl's breathing slowed and her shoulders relaxed. In that moment, Woody's friendly demeanor became a lifeline of reassurance.

A Compassionate Listener: For one youth, opening up during an interview proved incredibly difficult. As tears streamed down her cheeks, Warrior seemed to sense her sadness. Without prompting, he ambled over and rested his head in her lap - a simple gesture conveying unconditional acceptance. The girl's sobs gradually softened to sniffles as she stroked Warrior's fur. His grounding presence reminded her that she didn't have to face this struggle alone.

Moments like these highlight how invaluable our facility dogs are. With their warm, comforting presence, Woody and Warrior provide deep emotional support, helping our youth navigate trauma and find inner strength and resilience.

Missing & Anti-Trafficking **Youth Services**

Justine's Path to Independence

At the age of 17, Justine was identified as a victim of sex trafficking by the Omaha Police. She was referred to Project Harmony's Missing and Anti-Trafficking Youth Services Program, where she met Maddie, an Anti-Trafficking Youth Specialist. Maddie provided the support and empathy Justine needed to begin her journey towards recovery.

Maddie collaborated with partners such as the Omaha Police, Bridges to Independence, and Project Harmony's mental health team to coordinate a comprehensive network of services for Justine. Through therapy sessions, Justine began to confront her traumatic past and work towards healing and independence.

The journey was not easy, but with Maddie's unwavering support and guidance, Justine persevered. Together, they worked to secure stable housing and employment as Justine rebuilt her life. Now, at 19, Justine still grapples with the scars of her past, but in the safety of her own home, surrounded by the love of

her fiancé and loyal pets, she refuses to let her experiences define her. Justine's future is bright and full of possibility.

As she reflects on her hard-fought journey, Justine recognizes that none of it would have been possible without the support of Project Harmony's Anti-Trafficking Youth Services and Maddie's compassionate advocacy. They showed her a path out of darkness and helped her build a better life.

Breaking the Cycle

A sex trafficking ring exploited vulnerable individuals in our community, leaving devastation in its wake. When authorities identified the victims, Ines, an Anti-Trafficking Youth Specialist from Project Harmony, reached out to the Spanish-speaking families reeling from unimaginable trauma.

Ines bridged the language divide, providing crucial support and guidance as the families navigated the legal process. She remained a steadfast ally for all five victims, ensuring their voices were heard even as perpetrators awaited a federal trial.

Collaborating extensively, Ines coordinated a response network with partners like Omaha Police, Homeland Security, federal victim advocates, Boys Town, and Project Harmony's mental health services.

lnes' commitment went beyond arrests.

Understanding the long road to recovery ahead, she ensured victims had ongoing access to therapy and **support services**. Three victims continued therapy at Project Harmony, courageously confronting their pain, while another found refuge at Boys Town's residential program.

This case also pioneered new ground, as Project Harmony's Anti-Trafficking program developed an innovative process to pursue restitution, empowering victims to hold their abusers financially accountable.

Through her tenacious advocacy, Ines played a crucial role by giving these brave survivors a voice and the support system to reclaim their lives.


In 2022, the Omaha Fire Department implemented a Youth Fire Intervention program, co-located at Project Harmony, with the aim of reducing youth fire-setting incidents. This program provides intervention and education to children and youth who play with fire, enabling them and their families to seek assistance and access ongoing educational programming and community resources.

Recognizing the importance of collaboration and education, the Omaha Fire Department, in partnership with Project Harmony, brought one of the leading experts in youth fire-setting behavior, Dr. Robert Stadolnik, to Omaha for a two-day training course. Dr. Stadolnik shared his expertise with 30 local mental

health providers, equipping them with a deeper understanding of the underlying factors that contribute to this behavior in young people.



This initiative has proven invaluable, as it has facilitated access to the necessary help and support for numerous youth and their families who are grappling with this issue. By fostering a partnership between the Omaha Fire Department and mental health professionals, this program has created a comprehensive support system that addresses the root causes of fire-setting behavior, ensuring that these young individuals receive the guidance and resources they need to make positive choices and prevent potential harm to themselves and others.
