Dear Friends,

As I reflect on the past year at Project Harmony, I am filled with gratitude for your unwavering support. Because of you, thousands of children and families have found hope, healing and the resources they need to move forward from trauma.

In the past year, we served over 9,500 children and families—a milestone that once seemed unimaginable. What began as a child abuse response organization has evolved into a comprehensive, trauma-informed center supporting entire families. Through the years, we have added school-based mental health services, family advocacy and missing and anti-trafficking initiatives that address our community's evolving needs.

Through our school-based *Connections* program, we provided over 9,000 individual therapy sessions and facilitated 285 therapy groups across five school districts. This work is critical as we continue to see increased referrals from schools and caregivers recognizing the importance of early mental health intervention.

We are also serving more older youth, many through our Missing & Anti-Trafficking Youth Services. Our commitment to this vulnerable population has led to meaningful partnerships, including the co-location of Homeland Security on our campus to strengthen our fight against child trafficking.

Beyond Omaha, our Training Institute delivered over 30,500 trainings across 46 states plus Washington D.C. and 42 countries, equipping professionals to identify and respond to child abuse. Through national partnerships, we are helping other communities replicate our successful models, furthering our mission on a larger scale.

Sustainability remains a key focus. In 2024, we secured our first federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Grant, designating Project Harmony as a National Child Traumatic Stress Network Category III provider. This five-year, \$2.6 million grant expands trauma-informed mental health services, particularly for underserved populations such as ethnic minorities, military-affiliated families and foster care youth. Additionally, our advocacy efforts have led to increased state funding, ensuring continued support for our critical services.

Perhaps the most profound reminder of our impact came from a colleague in Texas. After learning about our efforts in combating missing youth and trafficking, her team implemented a similar approach. Shortly after, they rescued a missing child and launched an investigation into her traffickers. Stories like this reaffirm why we do this work—and why your support is so vital.

As we approach our 30th year, we remain committed to broadening our impact, ensuring financial stability, growing sustainably and fostering a strong team culture. Thank you for standing with us. Together, we are creating a world where every child feels safe, supported and empowered to thrive.



HUMAN RESOURCES

People & Culture

In 2024, Project Harmony continued to grow while staying true to our strategic initiative to *Build a Great Culture*. As our organization expanded, we prioritized *Learning Pathways* to enhance employee development. Our Training Team, Human Resources and Leadership worked collaboratively to solidify position descriptions and create structured learning paths for all roles, making onboarding more seamless and engaging. New hires benefited from a clearer roadmap for their first year, and feedback has been overwhelmingly positive—employees feel valued, supported and connected from day one.

Beyond onboarding, our culture-building efforts included initiatives like the **New Hire Breakfast with the Executive Team** and the **Emergenetics Workshop** at six months, where employees explore diverse thinking styles and best practices for collaboration. These intentional touchpoints have strengthened our inclusive and supportive workplace environment.

A key milestone in 2024 was our first **Gallup Engagement Survey**, which provided valuable insights into employee voice and culture. We achieved the



highest participation rate among peer organizations, reflecting our team's investment in shaping our workplace. The results guided leadership in setting goals focused on expectations, rewards and recognition. A standout finding was the high rating on mission and purpose, confirming that our team, regardless of role, feels deeply connected to the impact of our work. We will work to continue this initiative.

To celebrate teamwork and collaboration, we introduced the **Galaxy Award**, recognizing outstanding contributions across departments. Built from our *Circle of Stars* initiative, this has helped highlight the meaningful ways employees work together to drive success.

We also expanded **community outreach and recruitment**, participating in over 20 career fairs and
networking events to attract top talent and future interns.
Our paid **Internship Program** welcomed 16 interns who
gained hands-on experience and meaningful mentorship.
Their testimonials underscore the value of our training and
support, solidifying Project Harmony as a place where
professional growth and mission-driven work intersect.

Our employees are at the heart of everything we do. Through recognition, engagement and professional development, we are cultivating a workplace where people feel valued, supported and empowered to make a lasting impact.



PROJECT HARMONY TRAINING INSTITUTE

Expanding Impact: Project Harmony's Training Institute

In 2024, Project Harmony's Training Institute reached new heights, achieving **30,618 training completions**, a **46% increase** from 20,924 in 2023. Growth was driven by the addition of Spanish microlearning modules, instructor-led virtual sessions and expanded in-person courses, ensuring accessibility for diverse learners.

Attendees praised the engaging facilitation, relevant strategies and real-world applicability of the content. New highlights included Spanish-language sessions and multiple off-site locations.

A major initiative in 2024 was the **Hope Champions Network**, designed to equip individuals with the tools to foster resilience. This program includes:

- 1. **Train-the-Trainer Model** A 12-hour foundational training covering Trauma and Resilience, Empathic Strain and Building Hope.
- 2. **Coaching and Consultation** Hope Champions can call our trainers for assistance in applying hope science to real world scenarios they face in their work within the community.
- 3. **A Robust Network** Project Harmony has trained over 400 Hope Champions spanning across the U.S. Hope Champions collaborates with other professionals facing similar issues in their communities.

Key milestones included training 100 patricipants in Iowa as trainers, funded by the Iowa West Foundation, and reaching 6,886 participants through hope-centered training.

Project Harmony's impact spans 42 countries and 46 U.S. states plus Washington, D.C. through partnerships with Salvation Army, Educare, Omaha Public Schools, Buffett Early Childhood Institute and the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Through innovation and collaboration, the Training Institute continues to build trauma-informed communities, strengthening resilience and transforming lives worldwide.

CONNECTIONS

Strengthening Families Through Mental Health Support

Project Harmony's *Connections* program continues to provide accessible, high-quality mental health services to children and families, ensuring they receive the support they need to heal and thrive. By eliminating barriers to care, we connect youth with skilled therapists who help them navigate challenges and build resilience.

One young boy, Adam, was referred to *Connections* after struggling with anger and emotional regulation following exposure to domestic violence at home. His mother, a single parent of four, expressed concerns about his outbursts at school and requested a male therapist. Connections matched him with a therapist, who now meets with him during school hours, easing the burden on his busy mother. Early signs of progress are encouraging, as she recently shared: "Adam seems to really like him. I think this is going to work out great. Thank you for taking the time to find such a good fit for him."

A Family Finding Balance

Connections also helped a young girl who was referred for behavioral concerns. Recognizing that family stress played a significant role, the program provided her mother with services to manage emotional strain and improve parenting skills. To promote **stress reduction and family bonding**, Connections secured a **three-month YMCA membership**, allowing them to spend time together in a positive environment. Both mother and daughter successfully completed the program and reported noticeable improvements at home.

Through stories like these, the Connections program demonstrates the power of early intervention and holistic support. By offering tailored mental health services, reducing logistical barriers and addressing family-wide needs, Project Harmony is transforming lives—one connection at a time.





CHILDREN & FAMILY SERVICES

A Collaborative Approach to Healing

At Project Harmony, collaboration across our **Children & Family Services** ensures families receive comprehensive, trauma-informed care. One recent case highlights how our multidisciplinary teams worked together to support both a child and her caregiver through an incredibly difficult journey.

The child was initially referred to Children & Family Services due to concerns of sexual abuse by her grandmother's boyfriend. At the time, she was unwilling to disclose details or participate in a forensic interview. Our **Multidisciplinary Team** identified a need for additional support, referring her to **Project Harmony's Mental Health Services** to begin therapy at her own pace.

As therapy progressed, she disclosed the abuse to her mother, who had initially declined a forensic interview, fearing it would further traumatize her daughter. Meanwhile, the therapist recognized the mother's struggles with guilt and anger and made an internal referral for caregiver therapy. By supporting both mother and daughter, we created a safe space for healing.

When the child later disclosed additional details, her therapists worked together to educate the caregiver on the importance of a forensic interview. The **Forensic Interview Team** coordinated with therapists to

schedule the interview in a supportive environment. The child, who had built a strong connection with Warrior, one of Project Harmony's facility dogs, was able to have him present for comfort. Conducted in Spanish—her primary language—by our Spanish-speaking Forensic Interviewer, she provided a detailed disclosure, allowing Omaha Police Department (OPD) to fully open an investigation.

The child also received a medical exam on-site, offering reassurance to both her and her mother. Additionally, our **Spanish-speaking Family Advocate** helped the mother understand the investigation process and access further resources. The caregiver later provided evidence that strengthened the case.

This case exemplifies how collaboration across our programs creates a seamless,



compassionate experience for families in crisis. By adapting our approach to meet their unique needs, we helped the child feel safe enough to disclose, supported her mother through her own healing and worked alongside law enforcement to ensure justice. Our ability to integrate services ensures that every family we serve receives the care, resources and advocacy they deserve.



For the youth we serve, Woody and Warrior are more than just facility dogs—they are companions who provide immense comfort during times of distress and uncertainty.

Expanding Support: Iowa Satellite Office in Atlantic

Project Harmony's commitment to serving children and families extends beyond Nebraska. In December of 2024, we strengthened our regional impact by expanding services to **Atlantic**, **Iowa**, through our **Iowa Satellite Office**. This location increases access to critical **forensic interviews**, **advocacy and mental health support** for children and families in southwest Iowa who have experienced abuse or trauma.

By bringing services closer to home, we reduce barriers like **travel time and accessibility**, ensuring that children receive the support they need **without delay**. Our collaborative approach remains at the heart of this expansion, working closely with local law enforcement, child protective services and community partners to provide a seamless response for families in need.

This satellite location reinforces our mission: every child deserves safety, healing and hope—no matter where they live.

Celebrating Hope and Resilience

Missing & Anti-Trafficking Youth Services and the Power of Support



In 2024, Project Harmony's Missing & Anti-Trafficking Youth Services (MATYS) team continued to make a significant impact on youth affected by trauma, including those at risk of trafficking. One of the most heartwarming stories from this year is about the dedication of an MATYS Advocate, and the remarkable progress of a young woman with a history of extensive trauma.

This youth, who had faced multiple challenges—
sexual abuse, being a state ward and a history of
running away—has been supported by an MATYS
Advocate for nearly two years. Despite these ongoing
challenges, this Advocate remained a consistent,
positive presence, setting goals and working with the
youth to reduce her risks, improve behaviors and
ensure she had access to the help she needed.

At the beginning of December, the youth expressed a heartfelt desire to **celebrate her sixteenth birthday**

in a meaningful way—by cooking lunch for the MATYS team. This request was more than just a celebration; it was a chance for the youth to show her **appreciation** and have a positive experience that she'd never had before. The MATYS Advocate and the youth worked together to get solid, achievable goals in the six weeks leading up to the event—goals that included school attendance, refraining from drug use and other key behaviors.

By January, the youth had successfully met her goals. The celebration was everything she hoped for and more. At Project Harmony, the MATYS Advocate and the youth cooked a **special meal** for the MATYS and Omaha Police Department (OPD) teams, featuring **fried chicken, mashed potatoes and green beans**. The entire MATYS and OPD staff came together to celebrate her achievement, offering gifts, decorating the training room and even bringing a cake. The youth shared that it was the **first birthday party she had ever had** and was deeply moved by the support she received.

This story embodies the power of **collaboration**, **consistency** and **care** in transforming lives. The MATYS team's commitment to supporting youth, setting clear expectations and celebrating milestones underscores the profound impact we can have when we believe in the potential of every child.

YOUTH FIRE INTERVENTION

Youth Fire Safety Training

The Omaha Fire Department's Youth Fire Intervention Program

The Youth Fire Intervention Program, launched in 2022 by the Omaha Fire Department (OFD) and co-located at Project Harmony, aims to reduce incidents of youth fire setting through education and intervention. This critical program serves children and families who need support in addressing the dangerous behavior of playing with fire. By providing both intervention and ongoing educational programming, as well as access to community resources, the program works to help youth understand the risks associated with fire setting and make better decisions.


Youth involved in the program range from 3 to 16 years old, with high-profile cases including a 3-year-old using a torch lighter, a 4-year-old twin basement fire and a 7-year-old starting a house fire. One particularly concerning case involved a 13-year-old runaway, whose actions led to a house fire and multiple felonies. All educational classes for these youth are held at Project Harmony, providing a safe and supportive environment.

In response to the increasing demand for services, the program has also expanded by implementing classes to educate not only youth but also other departments throughout the state. This collaboration with the Omaha Fire Department and our community partners is vital to reducing the risks posed by youth fire-setting, helping families and youth make positive changes and contributing to the safety and well-being of the community.

In 2024, Project Harmony made remarkable strides in securing funding to expand vital services for vulnerable youth. The organization secured a three-year federal grant from the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) to expand the Missing & Anti-Trafficking Youth Program, as well as a Health and Human Services Innovation Challenge prize to support our national reach.

To strengthen sustainability, Project Harmony implemented a new grant prospecting and tracking system, improving reporting and project management. Enhanced collaboration with the finance team ensured more efficient grant utilization, while improvements in federal SAMHSA grant management streamlined reporting and strengthened coordination with the Mental Health team.

As Board Chair, I am continually inspired by the unwavering commitment of the Project Harmony team and all those who support our mission.
